At the members' meeting last December, Melody Truscott shared an impressive family bible bound in stamped leather and ornamented with metal corners and catches. Melody explained that the bible was believed to be a wedding gift to her husband's great-grandfather and his new bride in 1892. Melody reports, "Apparently he immigrated from Cornwall, England to Montana in 1896, and she followed the next year with their two sons. We assume it came with her, but it is huge and heavy! I can't imagine uprooting life, moving to a far off place and packing this treasure, along with everything else necessary for a new life in a new country. It was that important!

Eventually, the bible ended up with a family member not from the direct line. This relative lives in Pennsylvania and had access to folks who do a lot of restoration work for the Smithsonian. In our talks about family and ancestry he decided to return the Bible to the rightful family members after he had it reworked. We are very grateful to have it and so appreciative of the fabulous work done to it. There were a few clues to locations, a name and dates inscribed inside that were helpful in my research."

GEDCOM basics

During the January Skill Building session, the question of what is a GEDCOM file and how is it used came up more than once. A little research online, including a look at Family Tree Magazine and Dick Eastman's blog provided the following information:

GEDCOM is an acronym for **G**enealogy **D**ata **C**ommunication - the standard computer file format used by family genealogists to share information. It allows genealogy files to be

opened in any genealogy software program on a Mac or PC. This format allows different family tree software applications to understand and open the same family tree file, bypassing differences in coding that would normally prevent sharing. GEDCOM files will have the file extension ".ged" as in "myancesters.ged." GEDCOM was originally developed by the LDS Church in 1983. The current version has been in use since 1996. Simply put, GEDCOM allows you to download your information from

an email to www.bigsnet@googlegroups.com. It is very helpful to put your question in the subject line.

one program and upload to another. GEDCOM allows you to send some or all of your tree to your cousin or add your aunt's research to your tree. Or maybe you like to print your pedigree charts from Ancestry.com, but you are currently doing British research on FindMyPast.com. If you use a program like Family Tree Maker or Roots Magic to maintain your tree offline, you will be using GEDCOM to transfer your information.

Each family tree program has its own default file format, called a "proprietary format," which other software usually can't translate. But the various programs can all read and write GEDCOM files. However, because of the proprietary format, the data does not always transfer exactly, and you

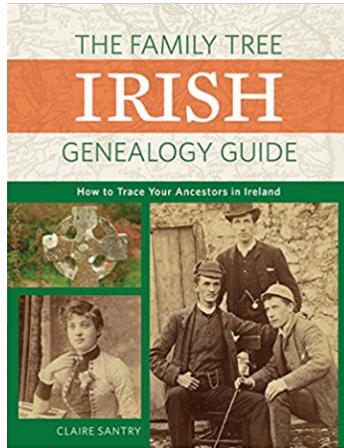
may not be able to transfer photos, citations and documents this way.

It should be relatively easy to figure out how to create a GEDCOM file within your family tree program. For example, in Ancestry, by clicking on "Trees," going to the bottom of your tree list and clicking on "Create and Manage Trees" you can access the **upload** command at the bottom of that page. If you click on "Manage Tree" next to an individual tree, you will find a command that will allow you to **download** a GEDCOM file for export. If you use other sites such as My Heritage or Find My Past, the process is similar and you can find the steps readily online. It is important to note that while you can upload a GEDCOM file to Family Search, you cannot create a GEDCOM file for export.

The Family Tree Irish Genealogy Guide

I would like to recommend my favorite new book for Irish research! Claire Santry is a well-known Irish genealogist and author of the Irish Genealogy News blog. She recently published ***The Family Tree Irish Genealogy Guide***, an indispensable reference for anyone working on Irish ancestry.

Santry first covers genealogy basics, topics including citations, research logs and the difference between primary and secondary sources. She then delves into the specifics of Irish research with a historical overview, an explanation of administrative divisions in Ireland, why land and property records are so important and immigration to the United States. She thoroughly covers what record collections exist, where to find them, the pros and cons of various websites and suggests research strategies and even illustrates them with several case studies.

The Family Tree Irish Genealogy Guide is readily available for purchase online or for check out at the Bremerton Branch of Kitsap Regional Library.

January Meeting

Our January Program Meeting included a thorough and informative presentation on **Passenger Lists and Ports of Arrival** by BIGS mentors Paula Schmidt and Sue Hassenmiller. Paula took us from colonial times through 1855, when the first official immigration center opened at Castle Garden, New York. Sue picked it up there and brought us into the 20th century. We learned, among other things, where to look for passenger lists, how various immigration laws impacted record keeping, and which were the most common ports of arrival for different immigrants.
