### News from the Board

#### *Return to Library for 2nd Friday Skill Building*

### ***Guidelines for Sound Genealogical Research***

Whether you consider yourself a beginner in uncovering your family's history, or you have been a serious researcher for years, it never hurts to review the guidelines for conducting sound genealogical research. One doesn't have to spend much on time on Ancestry.com or FamilySearch.com before noticing how much incorrect information gets posted to members' family trees. In order to avoid contributing to or perpetuating the errors, the National Genealogical Society recommends the following guidelines.

Remembering always that they are engaged in a quest for truth, genealogists and family history researchers consistently:

- Recognize that information relevant to answering genealogical questions can come from various types of sources, including but not limited to documents, artifacts, and genetic test-reports.
- Record the source for each item of information they collect;
- Test every hypothesis against credible evidence, and reject those that the evidence shows are incorrect;

- Seek original records as the basis for their research conclusions or reproduced images of original records when there is reasonable assurance the records have not been altered in their reproduction;
- Use compilations and published works primarily for their value as guides to locating original records and for analysis of the evidence discussed in them;
- State something as a fact or as a proven conclusion only when it is supported by convincing evidence, and identify the evidence when communicating the fact or conclusion to others;
- Limit with words such as "probably" or "possibly" any conclusion not based on convincing evidence, and explain their reasoning;
- Avoid distributing or publishing inaccurate information and unsupported conclusions in a way that may mislead other researchers;
- State carefully and honestly the results of their own research, and acknowledge all use of other researchers' work;
- Recognize the collegial nature of genealogical research by making their work available to others through publication, or by placing copies in appropriate libraries or repositories, and by welcoming critical comment;
- Consider with open minds new evidence and others' comments on their work; and

- Become familiar with research and ethical standards set by other genealogical organizations, such as the Board for Certification of Genealogists, the Association of Professional Genealogists, the International Commission for the Accreditation of Professional Genealogists, the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies, and the Genetic Genealogy Standards Committee.

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### ***Oh, that GPS!***

When you hear GPS do you think of the satellite-based "Global Positioning System" or the five elements of the "Genealogical Proof Standard?" If you chose the former, take a minute to review the following information, important to everyone undertaking genealogical research.

The purpose of the Genealogical Proof Standard is to show what the minimums are that a genealogist must do for his or her work to be credible. There are five elements to the Genealogical Proof Standard:

1. Reasonably exhaustive research has been conducted.
2. Each statement of fact has a complete and accurate source citation.
3. The evidence is reliable and has been skillfully correlated and interpreted.
4. Any contradictory evidence has been resolved.
5. The conclusion has been soundly reasoned and coherently written.

Any proof statement is subject to re-evaluation when new evidence arises.

## **Beginning Genealogy Essentials**

BIGS friend and mentor, Joleen Aitchison will be offering a two-part introductory course titled "Beginning Genealogy Essentials" at Village Green Community Center in Kingston on June 12 & 14 from 6:30 - 8:30 pm.

Participants will be introduced to the basics of genealogical and family history research, including the basic tools required to begin gathering and recording family history data. It also includes an look at some of the most common and useful websites for genealogy. The second session will provide an overview of data analysis to help create a research plan. Each participant will have the opportunity to begin exploring their own family history in a workshop setting. Expect to be informed, get excited and have fun!

## **Making Sense of the US Census Records**

The BIGS monthly meeting for May was held at the Bainbridge Library on Friday, May 18<sup>th</sup>. Our speaker was Janice Lovelace, PhD; her topic was "Making Sense of the US Census Records." She took us step by step through how to plan your search and mine the available information. She explained why we rely on census records: they are readily available; they let us double check family oral history; we can locate family in time and place, and identify neighbors. She took us through the years since the census began in 1790 and identified what information was collected for each of the federal census. She explored state and special censuses.

One of the many helpful takeaways from Dr. Lovelace's presentation was a list of the possible pitfalls you can encounter in the census:

- ~Names are often spelled incorrectly, or differently from one census to another.
- ~You may not recognize a given name if that person was generally known by a nickname.
- ~Depending on who was giving the report, ages may be rounded or guessed at. If the family was not at home, a neighbor may have given their best guess at names and ages.
- ~Not everyone told the truth about his or her age or immigration status.
- ~Relationships were sometimes misrepresented, e.g., someone listed as a boarder could be a relative, or someone listed as a child could have been adopted.

As helpful as the census can be to your research, don't forget there could be errors or misleading information.



The Guide to DNA Testing and Genetic Genealogy  
By Blaine Bettinger

Have you had your DNA tested? Spitting in the tube is the easy part! After that, it is all up hill. Once you get your results, and your matches start to show up, you'll find you need to learn a whole new vocabulary - genetic distance, MRCA, haplogroups, centimorgans - the list goes on. Where should you test? Any reason to test more than once? What should you test? Autosomal DNA? Y-DNA? How do you make sense of your various DNA matches?



Blaine Bettinger's Guide to DNA Testing and Genetic Genealogy is a valuable resource for anyone interested in answering these questions. Bettinger explains and compares the various types of tests available. He tells how to analyze and apply your test results. The guide is filled with charts and diagrams that make it easier to process all the information provided. He includes a handy glossary and offers research forms and worksheets. This book is available in paperback, for Kindle and, best of all, at the Bainbridge Island Library.

### Tip of the Month

To find your immigrant ancestor's passenger record, you'll need to know his or her original name—not necessarily the one found in US records. Many immigrants Americanized their names after arriving in the United States, translating given names to their American counterparts or using a similar-sounding name. Contrary to popular myth, Ellis Island official didn't change immigrants' names.
